Pastor Alicia's sermon from December 4, 2022 Scripture: Isaiah 11:1-10 & Matthew 3:1-12

What is peace? I know what it is not. It is not going to Costco in the afternoon on a Friday in December. That is not peace. Masses of people. Shopping carts everywhere. People slowly meandering through, weaving from one side to the other side. No straight lines happening. Carts on one side of the aisle while the operator of the cart is on the other side of the same aisle, blocking the entire thing. And then really, really long checkout lines. You can imagine the noise. The overstimulation. And this doesn't even account for the noise of any items that were for sale or on display. It was not peaceful, peace invoking, peace like, peace anything. It was far from all of that. Even the parking lot was a little chaotic.

So what is peace? It's also not the running from store to store trying to find the perfect gift. Or stressing about all of the baking that needs to be done. Or ordering Christmas cards and getting them all addressed and mailed before Christmas. Or getting the lights hung just right. And this is all obviously related to the holidays. How about throughout the rest of the year? And around the world? What is peace?

It's not war. It's not people or countries fighting. It's not devastation and destruction. It's not constant noise and upheaval and disarray. It's not all of this and so much more. Which, it always seems easy to say what peace is not. We know those scenarios. We have experienced them. We have seen them in our communities and in the world. We are able to identify them pretty darn quickly. And that's great because then we are able to move away from those situations when peace is the desired end result. We know what to expect.

Still, this doesn't answer the question what is peace? It doesn't paint the picture of the positive aspects of it, what it is we are to seek out when peace is needed. Is it the quiet of the air when snow is falling? Is it an empty house? Is it people getting along? Is it no more weapons? Is it everyone holding hands, standing in a circle, singing Kumbaya together? What is peace?

According to the online dictionary, peace is defined as "freedom from disturbance; tranquility; a state or period in which there is no war or a war has ended." And in regards to peace as an exclamation, it is "used as a friendly greeting; used as an order to remain silent; [and informally it means] leave, 'I woke up at seven, thanked my host, and peaced out." Peace, therefore, has many different layers and many different understandings.

For today, as the Advent candle of peace has been lit, as our litany was focused on peace and as peace is the premise throughout the hymns we are singing, what is peace? How are we to define it? And how are we to pay it forward as our Advent theme declares?

Our scripture passage from the prophet Isaiah depicts peace in a pretty profound way. And this is all without even mentioning the word peace. It's simply the concept peace. "The wolf shall live with the lamb, the leopard shall lie down with the kid, the calf and the lion and the fatling together, and a little child shall lead them. The cow and the bear shall graze, their young shall lie down together; and the lion shall eat straw like the ox. The nursing child shall play over the hole of the asp, and the weaned child shall put its hand on the adder's den. They will not hurt or destroy on all my holy mountain; for the earth will be full of the knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea."

This is an incredible way to describe peace. Complete opposites, prey and predator, together as one without challenges, without issue, without threat. These images are beyond fathomable. They have never been seen. They have never even been slightly seen. Who would think to try something like this? Who would think this was a good idea?

And still, this was the imagery prophesied by Isaiah. This was what would bring about a new world, a positive change, God's reality here on earth. This was how it would all be because of a shoot coming out from the stump of Jesse and a branch growing out of his roots. This was to be the end result.

Again though, this is all great and dandy, however the reality of this is something we will never see in our lifetime, let alone our children's lifetimes or their children's lifetimes or beyond that. Which begs the question, what are we to do with it? How are we to imagine this peace and work towards this peace when this peace is outside of our reach?

I mean it's a great reality and one that would bring about God's realm here on earth and let's be real. Although, if we are real and if we do desire for this to become what is, then maybe, just maybe we need to do our part to make it so. Maybe we need to strive for peace, embody peace, live peace and speak about peace. Maybe this needs to be our reality and our focus in our hearts, our homes, our church, our communities, our country, our world. Pay it forward with peace. Because isn't that the ultimate goal? Isn't that to guide what we do and who we are? Isn't that to be a piece of our mission?

At middle school and high school church camp this past summer the theme was peacemakers, living peace in our daily lives and recognizing the many ways it is present. As was shared, peacemaking is the "active reconciliation of people to God, one another and creation." Hmm, sound familiar? Like the words from Isaiah?

One activity we did to demonstrate just how much peace adds up occurred on the beach with sand. Small groups were invited to sit in a circle as a counselor placed a few grains of sand in their cupped hands. With each pinch of sand, the counselor would ask, "Is this a handful of sand?" Then more sand was added as each of these questions were also asked. Could you bury a treasure in this much sand? Could you trip on this much sand? Would this much sand bother you in your shoe? Could you build a sand castle with this much sand? Would you want this much sand in your sleeping bag?

As they considered these questions, the conversation was turned to the sand representing the good that a single life can hold. The youth were asked to imagine that each grain of sand is a small moment in time – a second, a minute – representing a moment in which someone acted to bring peace, wholeness or unity in the world.

On its own, one small act of peace doesn't appear to make much of an impact. But as was explained, if that same person seeks peace just one time each day for a year, that is 365 grains of sand – about one pinch of sand. In five years, that is almost 2,000 choices to create peace – about one teaspoon of sand grains. In 25 years, that is more than 9,000 opportunities to create peace. One person, just one act of peace a day – about 4 teaspoons of sand.

And then as the counselor stated, imagine that person does one act of kindness 12 times a day – just one choice each hour of the day. That is more than 100,000 actions towards peace in just 25 years – about ½ cup of sand. If that same person chose peace just 20 moments each hour for 25 years, that would add up to 2 million grains of sand – one cup of sand – 2 million moments of kindness, love or peace. Does this much sand make a difference? Would you want this much sand in your sleeping bag? Could you make something beautiful with this much sand?

And then with that one cup of sand representing one person, what happens if a cup of sand is added for each adult at camp? What happens if we add a cup of sand for each youth? What happens if we add a cup of sand for each person who has helped you, supported you, given you another chance, treated you kindly, sacrificed their comfort for your good? Does that much sand make a difference? Could you trip over this much sand? Could you bury a treasure in it?

Our lives are like the beach, built one grain of sand at a time. When we look at our lives, we can't necessarily see each tiny piece of good we have done, but over time those small moments can fill our hands with goodness. Each moment, each choice, has the power to add to the goodness of our life. In just the same way, peace is built by a great number of small, ordinary actions. If we want to make peace happen, we have to practice peace a little bit at a time. And all of those little bits, at the end of our lives, will fill our lives with peace. And the lives of those around us.

And maybe, just maybe "The wolf shall live with the lamb, the leopard shall lie down with the kid, the calf and the lion and the fatling together, and a little child shall lead them. The cow and the bear shall graze, their young shall lie down together; and the lion shall eat straw like the ox. The nursing child shall play over the hole of the asp, and the weaned child shall put its hand on the adder's den."
