January 2023 FISH Food Bank Coordinators Newsletter

2022 ended in a whirlwind for the FISH Food Bank. December started with several wonderful food drives that brought in tons of food then it was sprinkled with early winter snow, followed by ice storms that closed the food bank and now on the last day of the year the sun is shining and there is a rainbow in the sky.

During this crazy month, there were two consistent factors: clients continued to need food and the volunteers continued to step up and help wherever there was a need!

A great example of how wonderful FISH volunteers are, was when we received about 4,500 pounds of food from the Mt. Hood Meadows food drive. Since it was a new event, we didn't expect that amount of food and I had not arranged for extra people to work the food. So, I sent out an SOS for help and we were overwhelmed with all the great help that showed up. One young man I had never met, shared that a person at his tech company was a volunteer when she was in high school. She received the SOS and sent it out to her fellow employees. Since they don't go to work until noon on Wednesday, this young man answered the call. Now he wants to be on the list for when we need additional help. Amazingly, all the food was worked by noon that day.

With increasing priced in the grocery store and other shops, FISH is seeing more and more families who are looking to FISH for help. One clients shared when she was at the grocery store, she had to walk past the meat counter because she couldn't afford to buy meat. We discussed how hamburger is no longer an inexpensive choice. She ended the conversation by saying how much FISH has helped her family.

When I was shopping at local store where one of our clients works, he said to me, "It is a privilege to serve you." He went on to say; "you don't know how many times FISH has saved him and his family by the food they received." It is always heartwarming to know FISH does make a difference.

This cold weather has been especially hard on our homeless clients. I was able to talk with a couple of the homeless to see how they are doing. In talking with one young lady, who is totally estranged from her family, I said I had not seen her in a while and she replied she had been snowed in in her car in Dee. She felt it was warmer in her car than a tent, it is heart wrenching to see someone have to make those choices. Another young man, who is currently living in his car, has a job at Mt. Hood Meadows but did not have gas money to get to work. When I mentioned riding the bus up, his said his problem is he has a dog and he can't leave the dog in the car all day by itself. Of course, one of our wonderful volunteers slipped him a little gas money and they gave him a couple extra bags of dog food. These young people are struggling, but at least FISH is able to provide a little relief.

FISH is looking forward to 2023. We know that many of our clients will continue to struggle to make ends meet and FISH is excited to able to provide some relief for families and individuals. I am confident that in 2023 the same two consistent factors will prevail; there will be a growing need for FISH assistance and the wonderful FISH volunteers will continue to step up to help.

Thank You to Our Community

Once again Hood River County and the Mid-Columbia community have given wonderful support to the FISH Food Bank. Many, many organizations and business and well as individual have support FISH with donations of food and money. There are too many groups to name and then there is always a chance we will miss some. One surprise donation was the last night we were open before Christmas, Dani from Dani's Kitchen Shop gave FISH fancy decorated Christmas cookies. There were three very cute little cookies in a package, so we were able to share them when the clients registered. It was a fun cheerful way to wish our clients a happy holiday. The response was wonderful and many asked to take extra for all their kids.

Just a Few Highlights from 2022

- Thanks to Seth Milan and his Eagle Scout project, FISH now has new and very visible sign on Tucker Road.
- In April, FISH transitioned from car delivery to clients able to come back into the food bank to shop. It took a little while to work out the system and for clients to become comfortable coming back into the food bank to shop. Now we are back to the new shopping norm.
- FISH ended the program of providing a grocery store gift card to all clients once we were able to shop inside the food bank. This is after giving our clients thousands of dollars for food assistance.
- After assisting FISH for 27 months, the Hood River Rotary club transitioned from helping everyday to a new role of assisting at FISH distribution once a month. FISH is very appreciative of Rotary's help in the past and have developed a wonderful new working relationship.
- This year FISH has had an increased number of the migrant families requesting food. This has stretched FISH's resources, not only food but also volunteer help. During June many nights in Hood River they would help over 40 families. For example, on July 1st, 49 families request food.
- Because of the increase in Spanish speaking families, FISH formed a new partnership with Next Door, Inc. and they have been providing Spanish speaking volunteer to assist during distribution. This has been an important step in helping us serve our Spanish speaking clients, which make up almost 50% of our client base.
- FISH once again is using the Oregon Food Bank registration system called Link2Feed. Starting in April it was a steep curve in getting our clients enrolled. Now in December almost 90% of our clients are enrolled, to date we have 1250 families enrolled in Link2Feed.
- The Hood River Tucker Road FISH site turned 7 years old in the spring of 2022.
- During 2022, in addition to financial support several business experienced FISH Food Bank first hand by helping. In 2022, Dutch Bro's, Pacific Source, and Verizon all sent volunteers.
- FISH ended the year with two new fun fundraisers; "The Great Community Dine Out" For FISH Food Bank" and the Mt. Hood Meadows "Provide to Ride" food drive. The Mt. Hood Meadows event collected over 2 tons of food and \$33,000 to support families in need.
- Hector Hernandez-Sataray worked as a volunteer at FISH from the time he was a freshman in high school, then became an employee while in college. Now Hector is about to graduate from Nursing School but he came back to work one last time during his Christmas break. We will be saying good bye to Hector as an employee of FISH when he leaves in January. This is an end of a very successful story.
