

Hanging of the Greens Worship Service

- When: Sunday, November 30
- Service Name: Hanging of the Greens
- Time: 10:30am
- Significance: The First Sunday of Advent marks the beginning of the church year. This service explains how the evergreens (everlasting life), holly (the crown of thorns), and Advent wreath candles (hope, peace, joy, and love) all point toward the coming of Christ. Join us as we light the first candle and set our hearts on the true meaning of the season.

Chrismons: The ornaments we put on the tree in preparation for Advent

Chrismon, C-H-R-I-S-M-O-N, is a combination of two words: Christ and MONogram. A Chrismon is a symbol of Christ. Chrismons are composed of white and gold materials. White is symbolic of our Lord's purity and perfection. Gold, of his majesty, glory and triumph.

Chi Rho

The Greek letters chi and rho look like X and P in our Latin alphabet. Chi and rho are the first two letters in the holy title given to Jesus, Christ. It is the most common monogram for Christ.



Alpha & Omega

The Greek letters alpha (first) and omega (last) from Revelation 1:8 and 22:13, symbolize Jesus as the Christ who has come and will come again; it also symbolizes the continuity of God's presence throughout human history.



Cross & Chi

Chi is the first letter in the Greek word, Christos, and is the shortest monogram for Christ. Christ is the holy title given Jesus as the chosen one, the anointed one from God, the messiah. People of faith assumed this would mean power and royalty until it was found to be fulfilled in Jesus who was born in a stable and died on a cross. This symbol reminds us of how Jesus transformed our idea of what power and authority are.



Overlaid Latin Cross

We are reminded that Christ was faithful unto "death, even death on the cross." This cross has roses on it (Flower of Mary). The top of the cross is a shepherd's crook. The triangle is a symbol of the trinity. The triangle is also an Alpha. What looks like a "M" at the bottom of the cross is an Omega.



Fish

Ichthus is the Greek word for fish. It is an acrostic for Jesus Christ, God's Son, Savior. This compact acknowledgment of who Jesus is was used by early Christians as a secret sign to identify each other. Christians identified themselves as fish since Jesus promised to teach the disciples, Simon and Andrew, to fish for people.



Fish & Loaves

From two fish and a few loaves Jesus was able to feed thousands. This symbol reminds us that even something small given into Jesus' hands can be greatly useful. Many Christians see this as a sign for how the meager loaf and cup of the Lord's Supper become a great spiritual meal for all God's people.



Dove

The dove is an ancient symbol of salvation. It was a dove that Noah sent forth from the ark after the flood. When it returned with a green branch there was much hope. When it flew off and did not return, the remnant saved in the ark knew that the land was now fit as the bird's home and theirs. At Jesus' baptism a dove was what was seen when the Holy Spirit embraced him.



Crown

While Jesus is King, the only earthly crown he received was a crown of thorns. The greatest irony is that Pilate put "King of the Jews" on a plaque over Jesus' cross.



Shell

The shell is a natural holder for water, the substance used in Christian baptism.



Anchor

Like the stone foundation of a house which will stand against the storm, an anchor is a symbol of God's steadfastness which we can fully trust.



The Star of David

Sometimes called the Star of Creation, is a symbol that Jesus was a Jew and a descendant of King David. The six points may also be said to represent six aspects of God: love, mercy, wisdom, majesty, power, and justice. In this form, the two triangles represent the Trinity.

Trinity Symbols

From ancient times our ancestors have proclaimed that "The Lord is our God is One God." Yet we experience God as Creator, Christ as Savior, and the Holy Spirit as Sustainer.

Struggling with diversity in unity, early Christians began to speak of "One God in Three Persons," traditionally Father, Son and Holy Spirit. The Triquetra with a Circle is a most complicated Trinity symbol. The three loops making a triangle represent the three parts of the trinity. This is surrounded by a circle, which represents eternity.



Star, Five Pointed, with Rose

A five pointed star represents the Star of Bethlehem or Epiphany, when the Wisemen visited Jesus. The rose is the symbol for Jesus' mother, Mary.

Together these symbols represent the coming together of heaven and earth, God becomes flesh.
