FISH Food Bank October 2023 Coordinators Newsletter

At least twice a year I like to touch base with all the volunteers to let you know how much you are appreciated by the FISH Food Bank organization. Each year we have about 600 different volunteers give their time and effort to the FISH Food Bank. We could not help the families in our community without the wonderful help of all the volunteers. Every volunteer is important, and each job is essential in making our organization run. We continue to receive compliments on how positive our volunteers are and how efficient our food bank runs. That is because of all your help, Thank You!

October is going to be the month of change. The weather has definitely moved from summer to fall. Plus, at the FISH Food Bank we have an even bigger change. Marianne Brevard has decided to move from her position of Director of Operations to that of Special Projects Coordinator. Because the food bank has changed so much over the last 10 years, the FISH Board decided to create a new position, Executive Director, who will take up many of the duties the FISH Board have been doing.



Introducing Jacqueline Carey Jacqueline became the first ever Executive Director of the FISH Food Bank. We are excited to have Jacqueline in this position. She comes to FISH with many years of working in the private sector with the restaurant industry. She is a long-time resident of Hood River and brings many years of experience to this position.

Please join me in wishing Marianne Brevard much success in her next adventure and welcoming Jacqueline to FISH. Jacqueline is not exactly new to FISH as she started as a FISH volunteer at the beginning of summer, then

accepted the position of substituting for Marianne when she was on vacation during the summer. When you are at the food bank, please introduce yourself to Jacqeline, as she is anxious to get to know all our wonderful volunteers.

The FISH Board is excited about this new position, as FISH has grown exponentially over the years. Think back to the little site on Pine Street and how 15 clients meant a big night. Last Friday night Hood River FISH served 57 clients. Cascade Locks served around 55 clients in just one week. Our budget has grown, so has the number of employees and volunteers, and just securing food is a big job. It is important to be able to manage all these aspects, so the move to an Executive Director was just a natural next step. We are looking forward to the new changes in the FISH family.

What's Happening At FISH? I was expecting the normal drop in client numbers for September, as people move on when the weather gets colder, and the harvest starts winding down. But while there were a few days with a lower number of clients in September, there were plenty of days with high numbers. At some distributions we are registering up to 10 new families. The plus side of this is we are helping many people who are food insecure in our area.

I always find it fascinating talking to the FISH clients. Everyone has a story to tell. This month I have seen many smiles and some disappointments. I find it heartening that at least two different clients told me on Friday that they had applied for jobs that week and hoped not to have to use our services much longer. I will often ask unhoused clients what their plans are for the coming winter, and I was excited when one lady reported she signed a rent lease that day, so she will no longer be houseless. One young, unhoused client reported she had a good day because she was able to cook her food and not burn it. She said it actually tasted good. Sometimes you have to take the small wins in a day.

While most of our clients are positive and very thankful for our help, I still worry about them. There was the gentleman who used his last dollar to get to Hood River and said he was headed to Parkdale to pick fruit. I gently reminded him that they are almost done picking fruit. (One of our wonderful volunteers, quietly slipped him a few dollars so he had bus fare.) Or I worry about the client who is living in his car, but it is not just the man but also a female and young child. Then there is the client that thought he was going to walk to California, made it to Dee and decided his legs were not going to take him that far. He returned to Hood River and was excited because he got a tent.

This year we have been able to serve many of the farm workers in the area. This is an area we have wondered why we were not able to reach. So, we saw it as a positive that we were able to help farm worker families. Many of these individuals have limited English speaking skills. I have no Spanish speaking skills, but I still enjoy "shopping" with these clients. A smile goes a long way and I always get a laugh when we get to the fresh pears and ask if they would like some. Since they are picking and eating pears all day long, they don't want to take any home. I was talking with a group of young Hispanic men who were waiting to shop, I told them I could guess the one thing they would not want, pears. They all laughed and agreed!

<u>Volunteer Spots Available At FISH</u> FISH Volunteers are busy active people who love to travel. Winter is especially favorite time for volunteers to leave the area. Unfortunately, there are also times that our volunteer's health does not allow them to do their volunteer duties. Consequently, while some volunteers are off having fun or recuperating, there are volunteer spots that we need to fill. If you would like to fill in for our traveling or recuperating volunteers, please contact me.

Some of the areas where we can use help:

- *Pick up food from Rosauers or Safeway. This happens at about 8:00 to 8:30 AM and requires a large car/van or pickup truck. The bins you pick up can be heavy, Hood River site.
- *Shopping with the Clients on Wednesday morning. 9:00 AM until 10:00 AM. You will walk with the clients as they select their food choices, reminding them of the number of items they can select, take groceries in the bags and help take the food to the car Hood River site.
- *Wednesday mornings, helping in the fruit and vegetable area. Helping sort the food that comes from donations and getting the food ready for distribution. Because we shop on Wednesdays, we need to get this started early. About 8:00 to 10:00 AM. Hood River site.
- *Helping clients shop during the evening distribution at the Hood River site. This is either on Monday, Wednesday, or Friday afternoon. Distribution starts at 3:00 PM and ends at 5:00PM on Monday and Friday and 5:30 PM on Wednesday. Spanish language is always a plus but not required. Also, we can also use someone to help take the groceries to the cars.
- *Helping at the Hood River registration desk during distribution. This is for some Monday's and some Friday's from about 2:45 PM to 5:00 PM. Some computer skills are helpful but not required.
- *Driving the FISH Box truck to Cascade Locks from Hood River, to deliver food on 3rd Wednesday, leave about 9:00 AM and be back to Hood River by 10:30ish. In addition to driving, you would assist in helping unload the truck.

 Also on the 4th Wednesday of the month. You would leave around Noon, then up unload the food and return.
- *Helping unload the food truck at the Cascade Locks site. This is on the 3rd Wednesday of each month. Truck arrives about 9:30 AM. Does require being able to lift food boxes.

*Helping at the Cascade Locks distribution, on the 4th Wednesday and the Saturday following the 4th Wednesday. Various positions are available. Wednesday distribution is from about 2:00 PM to 6:00PM, Saturday is from 11:00 AM to Noon.

*Parkdale FISH site can always use substitute volunteers to help with the distribution on the 1st and 3rd Monday of the month. This is from 4:00PM to 6:00PM.

Shout Out to Cardinal Glass A special thank you to Cardinal Glass for sponsoring a challenge to the community during the August Families in the Park event to raise funds to assist food insecure families of the Gorge. Cardinal Glass offered to match up to \$1000 each week for the money donated to FISH Food Bank during the month of August. Cardinal Glass was able to match \$5,000 to the \$20,103 donated in August. Thus because of their efforts the total donated dollars to purchase food in August was \$25,500. *Thank you, Cardinal Glass, for helping families who face food insecurity each month.*
